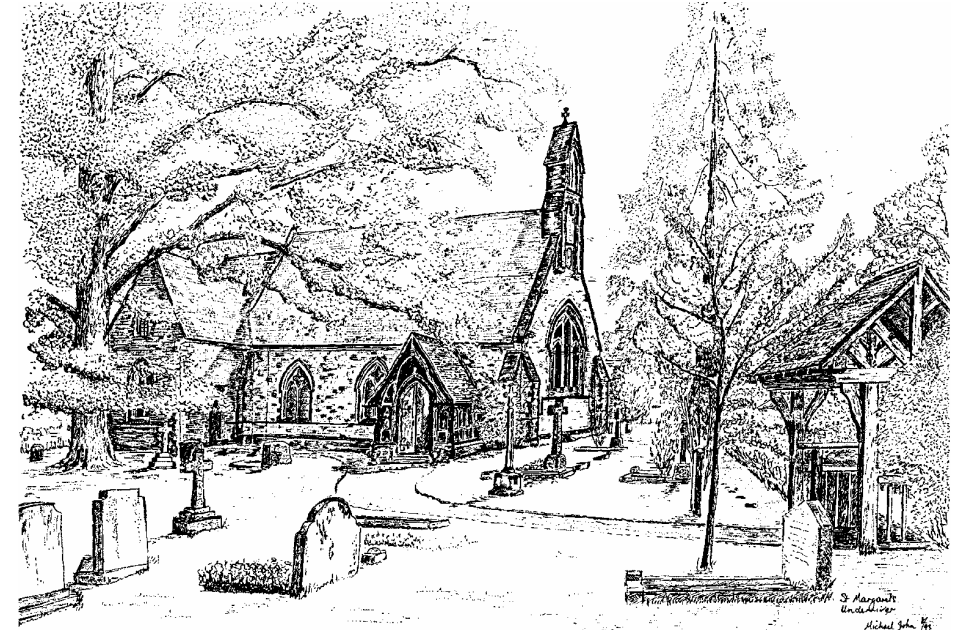

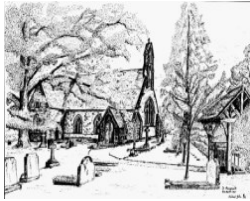

Ultrafast Broadband to come to Underriver

The campaign to improve the broadband service to the village has borne fruit as the target for customer orders was reached two weeks ago. The brand new full fibre optic network will link customers directly to the internet without resorting to traditional copper wire whose signal strength depends on distance from the cabinet, weather etc. Amazing as it may seem, this will put our community in the top 1-2% for digital access in the country if not further afield as well.

Big congratulations to Linda Crammond & Malcolm Severs who achieved almost a 50% sign up rate in Underriver – the highest among any of the villages that the project will cover.

As soon as more information on the schedule of works is available this will be passed to the village webmaster. If you haven't already signed up for the service, you can still do so by going to www.gigaclear.com/underriver

FROM THE VICAR

Since his debut with the Tonhalle Orchestra, Zurich and Sir Neville Marriner in 2007, he has performed with major orchestras worldwide. His debut CD was chosen by The Strad as their selection of the month and his recordings of the Schumann Cello Concerto and two Haydn concertos have received universal acclaim. Likewise, José Gallardo has received numerous national and international awards. He performs and records extensively, collaborating with prestigious artists, and is involved in master courses with Maxim Vengerov, Steven Isserlis and others. Nicolas and José's CD recording of works by Schumann and Killmayer has met with overwhelming success. We are promised a very exciting evening!

LOCAL THEATRE IN NOVEMBER



There are quite a lot of shows to highlight in November. So I will list them by venue.

The Stag Theatre, Sevenoaks (01732 450175).

Sevenoaks Players' year's autumn production is Neil Simon's **Ru-mours**. Described as a riotously funny and fast-moving comedy, replete with crossed purposes and doomed lives, this sounds a really good evening out. *Wednesday 13th to Saturday 16th November.*

I must also mention **the Stag's 30th Anniversary Talk**, given by Margaret Durdant-Hollamby and celebrating the Stag's and Sevenoaks' history from the 1936 days of the Majestic Cinema. This should be a fascinating afternoon. *Sunday 10th November at 2.30pm.*

The Assembly Hall Theatre, Tunbridge Wells (01892 530613 / 532072).

Joe Pasquale (fresh from *Spamalot* in the West End) will play Sherlock Holmes in the spoof show **Ha Ha Holmes!** Ben Langley will play Doctor Watson and Andrew Fettes everyone else.

The Russian State Ballet and Opera House, together with a large live orchestra, will give one single performance of **The Nutcracker**. This magical Christmas show, with Tchaikovsky's wonderful music, should delight all ballet-lovers. *Sunday 17th November at 7.30pm.*

This year's pre-Christmas production by the Tunbridge Wells Operatic and Dramatic Society will be Rodgers and Hammerstein's **Oklahoma**, surely the best of all the American musicals. Oh, what a beautiful evenin' this should be! *Tuesday 26th to Saturday 30th November at 7.30pm (with matinées).*

The Trinity Arts Theatre, Tunbridge Wells (01892 678 678).

Transport will present a "reinvention" of Shakespeare's **As You Like It**. Rosalind has fallen in love with Orlando; and, banished from their homeland, – they find unexpected freedom in the depths of the forest. A lovely play, but I'm not sure about "reinventing" it. *Friday 8th November at 8pm.*

Those not scared of having their spines chilled should look out for Blackeyed Theatre's performance of Bram Stoker's gothic thriller **Dracula**, adapted by John Gorman - with specially commissioned live music, powerful ensemble performances and innovative design. *Friday 22nd November at 8pm.*

UNDERRIVER or UNDER RIVER

This is an extract from an article which appeared in the 'Underriver Gazette' in 1989 by Colonel R.G.C.Taylor in response to the appearance of differing spellings of the name of our village. Should it be one word or two?

"The Council signs at either end of the Village spell it as one word and so does the Post Office. The majority of us in the Village accept this as being correct. On the other hand most of the signs at road junctions leading to the Village spell it as two words: so also do the Ordnance Survey maps which I have consulted (going back to 1909) and also the old tithe maps. About six years ago I visited the Tithe Office in Finsbury Circus and looked at a map dated 1840(?) and quite clearly it is there spelt as two words.

The earliest printed record of Underriver which I have been able to trace is in Hasted's 'Kent', published in 1797, in which it states:

The Vicarage of Kemsing with Seal, consists of the final tithes of both Parishes, with a portion of the great tithes in Seale, formerly called Bordirivere, now Under River, consisting of about 800 acres of land.

There can therefore be no doubt at all that in those days the word was spelt as two.

At that time there was a Great Under River and a Little Under River; the former was what we would now know as the village proper (ie the Church, School and Inn) while Little Under River was in the area of Absaloms and Underriver House. Old maps repeat this pattern up to about of the middle of the last century (19th), after which the Village seems to have joined together both in name and fact – possibly when the Church was built, thereby providing a focal point."

If you know of any interesting history of the village or houses or people in it I should be pleased to hear from you.

UNDERRIVER RECIPES

Devonshire Pasties



My dear, much missed, father was a “Devon boy”. One of my most vivid childhood memories is of him sitting in the bath belting out ‘Widcombe Fair’ at the top of his voice in the broadest South Devonian accent imaginable. Another childhood memory is of my mother’s Devonshire pasties. She was not a Devonian so the recipe must have been passed to her by my grandmother. It makes a treat good enough to bring Bill Brewer, Jan Stewer, Peter Gurney, Peter Davey, Dan’l Widdon, Harry Hawk, old Uncle Tom Copley and all home pretty fast!

Short crust pastry (12 oz flour and 6 oz fat. The pastry must be lard-based; nothing else gives quite the right flavour)

12 oz sirloin steak diced (not stewing steak. Rump will do but the flavour isn’t quite as good in my humble opinion). The pieces need to be small but not minced.

2 large onions diced small

4 large raw potatoes diced small—(unlike Cornish Pasties these do not contain swede or other root vegetables)

Seasoning

Prepare the pastry, divide into the number required and roll out to about ¼ inch thickness keeping a good round shape. On one half, place a layer of meat, followed by a layer of diced onion, followed by a layer of potato. Season. Wet the edges of the pastry and fold one half over the other and crimp together, making a good seal. Brush over with a beaten egg. Cook at 200 C for about 10 minutes, then in a moderate oven 160 C for a further 40 to 45 minutes. Smaller pasties need less.
